Forgotten or unknown Stanton history:

Music is an important part of Stanton's history. On August 25th of this year, John Schultz retired as the organist at Mamrelund Lutheran Church. He was the organist for 30 years. John and family came to Stanton in the Summer of 1967after he was hired to be the new music (vocal and band) teacher for the high school and junior high. After teaching for many years he retired in 2000. He's been connected with music in Stanton for a third of its history. This led to the question, "When did music education begin in Stanton?

In the April 23, 1874 (p. 2) Red Oak Express, the "From Stanton" column read, "Our pleasant and attractive school house on the hill (this was a country school built in town for the town's pupils) will be occupied to its fullest capacity"..." and will include a music class..."

In 1893, teacher Miss Grace Beymer wrote about the "Purpose of Music in Public Schools" (Red Oak Express, Dec. 8, 1893, p. 1..) "Music opens the child's nature and makes it receptive. People are growing to realize this more and more as is shown by so much singing being introduced in the latest methods of primary and kindergarten work. It makes the child's school life beautiful and homelike." "This means an entire revolution in ten or fifteen years. It means good singing in our churches and Sunday schools. It means good orchestras and good bands It means that everyone will have a taste for good music and will be able to appreciate it. So music must not be treated as a useless fad for time has proven it to be of great value."

During those first 50 years (1870-1920) music became a part of the formula that made up Stanton. Music appreciation was lived out over the years through adult music groups: Women's Chorus, Men's Glee Club, Silver Cornet Band, Concert Band, Marching Society, Oratorio Society. The leader of these groups was often the organist at the Swedish Lutheran Church.

In May of 1924, the Stanton Orchestra and Apri male octet gave a program over the radio from Omaha. (Stanton Call, May 29th, 1934, p.1.) "E.E. Larson, president of the local Community Club, gave a talk during the program in which he told the outside world about

our little white city. We think his talk will be appreciated by our readers, so we are publishing it as follows:

'Ladies and Gentlemen, Boys and Girls, and all lovers of good music in the radio world. GREETINGS from Stanton, Iowa.

Stanton, Iowa is located about 60 miles east of Omaha, on the Burlington Railway and on the Iowa State Primary Road No. 120.

Stanton has a population of 750 people of which 95 per cent are Scandinavian or close descendants thereof. Our people are very industrious and love their homes and everything pertaining thereto. Every able-bodied man has a desire to work, and we have had no use of our jail for several years. 98 percent of our people own their homes and are known for their finial hospitality.

Our citizens are great lovers of good music. We have at present time several good musical organizations in good standing. These organizations are supported loyally by the citizens in general. The Oratorio Society has rendered Handel's Messiah for six consecutive years and are planning on giving it again next year. Our audiences have often included music lovers from far distances. We also have the Community Orchestra and the Arpe Male Octette, composed entirely of home talent and who speak for themselves here this evening. We have a high school Girls Glee Club and a High School Orchestra of 30 pieces, besides two well trained Church Choirs. With only one exception, these organizations are all under the direct leadership of Professor A. W. Anderson, which speaks very highly for him as a man of outstanding musical ability. We have two churches, with a total membership of 1520 and a Sunday school enrollment of 400.



Stanton has an accredited school with an enrollment of 320 pupils. We are erecting a new brick gymnasium and auditorium. We have about 50 of our high school graduates attending universities or other high institutions of learning, which speaks highly for our schools.

Stanton is generally known as the "Leading Town in Southwestern lowa" a slogan for which we are indebted to Colonel H. L. Nelson. We extend to you a most hearty welcome to come to Stanton. I thank you."

Over the years Stanton has had many accomplished musicians. Some were here only briefly, some stayed for many years. Those who taught imprinted their musical abilities on their students. This continues with present teachers and students. Mr. Schultz is one of those teachers.

At the end of the service on Mr. Schultz's retirement Sunday, his adult children invited those of us who had their dad as a teacher to come forward to sing "The Benediction" with their dad conducting. 40-45 of us responded. Some of us needed music, some didn't. For those of us who had sung with Mr. Schultz years ago, this was personalized music therapy. The music briefly transported us back to a time when we were younger and carefree. As we sang John proudly centered us again through music. (ml)
