Childhood Memories of the Pioneer Days of 1869 by Mrs. C. A. Dahlquist

The first settlers, the pioneers of this community, came not by train but in the old covered wagon in the month of June, 1869, locating on a slope south of the present John Fogelquist farm residence. (Wesley Erickson lived on the farm in 1970).

The party included my father Samuel Anderson, his wife and six children: John S. Anderson, Mrs. John P. Larson and Mrs. Chas. Quist of Stanton and Mrs. C A Dahlquist of Chicago. The deceased are Mrs. Ida C. Anderson of Colorado Springs, CO, my two uncles Frederick Anderson and wife and Johannes Larson and wife. These families emigrated from Neoga, IL to Stanton.

My Father with his family and Mr. and Mrs. Johannes Larson went overland in covered wagons taking three weeks to make the trip. At that time we had to ford rivers and creeks, camping and cooking by the roadside, baking our bread at farm homes. This being the month of June there were plenty of cherries along the way which we children received permission to pick.

My two uncles boarded the train from Neoga, taking it to the end of the line at Afton, Iowa. They continued their journey in a hack to Villisca where they joined us. We then set out together, forging the Nodaway River as there were no bridges.

We followed a trail across the prairie to a location about three-and-one-half miles south of Stanton where we camped through the summer.

Those who did not have wagons for living purposes built dug outs in the side of the hill with a window and door attached.

Others who made up our little settlement were Peter Lantz and wife, Gustaf Anderson and wife, Charles Vilgren, Nils Sandberg and Johannes Sellergren.

Being a girl of 13, I shall never forget the impression I got from the first religious meeting we held in our own little settlement—out in the open, surrounded by nature's beauty; wild flowers in full bloom. The blue heavens seemed to envelope the small gathering. In the midst of us standing so stately was Dr. Rev. B. M. Halland delivering his message from Our Father and Savior above. The hymns were sung with a spirit that gave an

echo to the hillside and a ring through the valleys. A more solemn worship was never witnessed in the Stanton community.

In the fall of 1869, our camp moved to Stanton locating in the vicinity of the present home of Miss Julia Johnson and lived in the dug outs through the winter. Julia's house, now torn down, was just across the road west of Anderson Park and north of the railroad track. A good natural spring here supplied all with water.

In the spring of 1870, all moved to their respective farms that they had purchased during the winter and built for themselves houses of one, two or three rooms each.

I was working at Villisca when the first train went over the newly laid track. I had the honor of being the first woman to ride between Villisca and Stanton. I was accompanied by my brother. We were seated on a flat car. I held tightly to him fearing I would be blown away.

To my confirmation classmates of the year 1872, I extend my love and heartiest greetings. I do well remember the days we met with Rev. Halland for class study, the hours being from 9 am to 6 pm. Rev. Halland had the utmost kindness and patience with us. Mrs. Halland served dinner at every meeting of the class always giving us cheer and a pleasant greeting.

To the congregation as a whole and to the pastors, Dr. Rydback, Dr. Peterson, Rev. Elmquist and Rev. Kraft, I send my best regards and heartiest greetings. To all the old settlers who are still with you, a kind remembrance.

As my health will not permit, I regret very much that I am unable to be present, yet in heart and soul I am with you. May God bless you all.

Mrs. Dahlquist sent these greetings to her confirmation class reunion being held during Mamrelund's 60th anniversary celebration in 1930. Her letter comes from Lest We Forget: A Stanton History, p. 94. The photo of Carl and Emma Dahlquist is from the "Samuel Anderson & Family History" binder in the SHCC office.

Emma Anderson Dahlquist was born June 19, 1855, in Narunga, Alvsborgs lan, Sweden to Samuel and Anna Maria (Johansdotter) Anderson. With her parents and siblings she left Sweden in 1864 and traveled to Neoga, Illinois, then to Stanton. They were charter members of Mamrelund Lutheran Church.

Emma married Carl August Dahlquist on Jan. 27, 1877. They farmed one mile east of Stanton until 1917 when they moved to Chicago. Emma died Aug. 23, 1938, and Carl died Nov. 14, 1838, both in Chicago. They are buried in the Mamrelund Cemetery, Stanton.

Jimmie was the longest living WW II veteran of the Stanton area. James entered the service in 27 May 1943 at Ft. Crook, Nebraska and was discharged on 9 April 1946 at Camp McCoy, Wisconsin.







Jimmie's military awards included the Bronze Star, American Theatre Service Medal, European-African-Middle Eastern Theatre Service Medal with 2 Bronze Campaign Stars for Rhineland and Central Europe, Occupation of Germany Medal, WW II Victory Medal, Good Conduct Medal, Expert and Combat Infantry Badge, Expert Rifle and Machine Gun Badge and Certificates of Appreciation from the Holocaust Memorial Council and from the Republic of France. A Stanton business

City of Stanton Receives 'Great Places' Title

"The Stanton Community is honored to receive the Iowa Great Places Designation, and we look forward to working with the Iowa Department of Cultural Affairs. Stanton has always had amenities and people that make the community a great place to live, work and play. We look forward to the opportunities that come with this designation," said Jenna Ramsey, Stanton Community Development Director.

"In recent years, Stanton residents have seen new and creative businesses spring up downtown, alongside iconic symbols of the community's Swedish heritage. A new events center opened and plans for adding public art are in the works" read the press release.

Stanton and seven other lowa communities will receive support through two creative place making programs that help regions attract investment, tourism and quality-of-life enhancements.

Indianola and Stanton were chosen as new Iowa Great Places. The Sixth Avenue Corridor in Des Moines and cultural and entertainment districts in Ames, Cedar Rapids, Des Moines, Elkader and Spencer were re-designated.
